

ORDINANCE NUMBER 2007 (9)

AN ORDINANCE BANNING SMOKING IN PUBLIC PLACES, PROVIDING PENALITIES FOR VIOLATIONS THEREOF AND RELATED PURPOSES.

WHEREAS, the City of Petal, Missussippi, acting by and through its Mayor and Board of Aldermen, does hereby find that the 2006 U.S. Surgeon General's Report, The Health Consequences of Involuntary Exposure to Tobaccu Smoke, has concluded that (1) secondhand smoke exposure causes disease and premature death in children and adults who do not smoke; (2) children exposed to secondhand smoke are at an increased risk for sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS), acute respiratory problems, ear infections, and asthma attacks, and that smoking by parents causes respiratory symptoms and slows lung growth in their children; (3) exposure of adults to secondhand smoke has immediate adverse effects on the cardiovascular system and causes coronary heart disease and lung cancer; (4) there is no risk-free level of exposure to secondhand smoke; (5) establishing smoke free workplaces is the only effective way to ensure that secondhand smoke exposure does not occur in the workplace, because ventilation and other air cleaning technologies cannot completely control for exposure of nonsmokers to secondhand smoke, and (6) evidence from peer-reviewed studies shows that smoke free policies and laws do not have an adverse economic impact on the hospitality industry.

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Alderman have examined the U.S. Department of 1th and Human Services, The Health Consequences of Involuntary Exposure to Tobacco & A. Report of the Surgeon General. U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, iters for Disease Control and Prevention, National Center for Chronic Disease Prevention and lealth Promotion, Office on Smoking and Health, 2006 and found certain conditions to exist which make it necessary to adopt certain Codes in order to preserve the general health, safety, and welfare of its citizens: and that numerous studies have found that tobacco snoke is a major contributor to indoor air pollution, and that breathing secondhand smoke (also known as environmental tobacco smoke) is a cause of disease in healthy nonsmokers, including heart disease, stroke, respiratory disease, and lung cancer.

disease, stroke, respiratory disease, and lung cancer.

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Alderman agree with The National Cancer Institute determination in 1999 that secondhand smoke is responsible for the early deaths of approximately 53,000 Americans annually. (National Cancer Institute (NCI), "Health effects of exposure to environmental tobacco smoke: the report of the California Environmental Protection Agency. Smoking and Tobacco Control Monograph 10," Bethesda, MD. National Institutes of Health, National Cancer Institute (NCI), August 1999) and that The Public Health Service's National Toxicology Program (NTP) has listed secondhand smoke as a known carcinogen. (Environmental Health Information Service (EHIS), "Environmental tobacco smoke: first listed in the Ninth Service, NTP, 2000, reaffirmed by the NTP in subsequent reports on carcinogens, 2003, 2005.) WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Alderman believe there is no safe level of exposure to secondhand smoke. (Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), "Respiratory health effects of passive smoking: lung cancer and other disorders, the report of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, Smoking and Tobacco Control Monograph 4," Bethevala, MD: National Institutes of Health, National Cancer Institute (NCI); Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), August 1993; California Environmental Protection Agency, California Environmental Tobacco Smoke," 1997; California Air Resources Board, "Proposed identification of environmental Induces onsoke as a toxic air contaminant," Sacramento: California Environmental Protection Agency (Cel EPA), Air Resources Board, Stationary Source Division, Air Quality Measures Brunch, Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment (OEHHA), September 29, 2005.)

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Alderman have examined a study of hospital admissions for acute myocardial infarction in Helena, Montana before, during, and after a local law eliminating smoking in workplaces and public places was in effect, determining that laws to enforce smoke free workplaces and public places may be associated with a reduction in morbidity from heart disease. (Sargent, Richard P.; Shepard, Robert M.; Olantz, Stanton A., "Reduced incidence of admissions for myocardial infarction associated with public smoking ban: before and after study," British Medical Journal 328: 977-980, April 24, 2004.)

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Alderman conclude that secondhand smoke is particularly hazardous to elderly people, individuals with cardiovascular disease, and individuals with impaired respiratory function, including asthmatics and those with obstructive airway disease. (California Environmental Protection Agency (Cal EPA), "Health effects of exposure to environmental tobacco smoke", Tobacco Control 6(4): 346-353, Winter, 1997.) The Americans

"Place of Employment" means an area under the control of a public or private employer that employees normally frequent during the course of employment, including, but not limited to, work areas, private offices, employee lounges, restrooms, conference rooms, meeting rooms, classrooms, employee cafeterias and hallways. A private residence is not a "place of employment" miless it is used as a childcare, adult day care, or health care facility. "Private Club" means an organization, whether incorporated or not, which is the owner, lessee, or occupant of a building or portion thereof used exclusively for club purposes at all times, which is operated solely for a recreational, fraternal, social, patroite, political, hencevolent, or ablietic purpose, but not for pecuniary gain, and which only sells alcoholic beverages incidental to its operation. The affairs and management of the organization are conducted by a board of directors, executive committee, or similar body chosen by the members at an annual meeting. The organization has setailpished bylaws and/or a constitution to govern its activities. The organization has been granted an exemption from the payment of federal income tax as a club under 26 U.S.C. Section 501.
"Public Place" means an enclosed area to which the public is invited or in which the mublic is

"Public Place" means an enclosed area to which the public is invited or in which the public is permitted, including but not limited to, banks, bars, educational facilities, gaming facilities, health care facilities, hotels and motels, laundromats, public transportation facilities, reception areas, restaurants, retail food production and marketing establishments, retail service establishments, retail stores, shopping malls, sports areass, theaters, and waiting rooms. A private club is a "public place" when being used for a function to which the general public is invited. A private residence is not a "public place" unless it is used as a childcare, adult day care, or health care facility.

"Restaurant" means an eating establishment, including but not limited to, coffee shops, cafeterias, sandwich stands, and private and public school cafeterias, which gives or offers for sale food to the public, guests, or employees, as well as kitchens and catering facilities in which food is prepared on the premises for serving elsewhere. The term "restaurant" shall include a bar area within the restaurant.

"Service Limited" means an indoor line in which one the more approximations.

"Service Line" means an indoor line in which one (1) or more persons are waiting for or receiving service of any kind, whether or not the service involves the exchange of money.

"Shopping Mall" means an enclosed public walkway or hall area that serves to connect retail or professional establishments.

"Smoking" means inhaling, exhaling, burning, or carrying any lighted cigar, cigarette, pipe, or other lighted tobacco product in any manner or in any form.

"Sports Arena" means sports pavilions, stadiums, gymnasiums, health spas, boxing arenas, swimming pools, roller and ice rinks, bowling alleys, and other similar places where members of the general public assemble to engage in physical exercise, participate in athletic competition, or witness sports or other events.

n 2. Application of Article to City of Petal Owned Facilities

All enclosed facilities, including buildings and vehicles owned, leased, or operated by the City of Petal, shall be subject to the provisions of this Article.

Section 3. Prohibition of Smoking in Enclosed Public Places

Smoking shall be prohibited in all enclosed public places within the confines of the city limits of the City of Petal, including but not limited to, the following places:

- Aquariums, galleries, libraries, and museums.

 Any publicly owned building or structure.

 Areas available to and customarily used by the general public in businesses and non-profit entities patronized by the public, including but not limited to, banks, laundrom professional offices, and retail service establishments.

With Disabilities Act, which requires that disabled persons have access to public places and workplaces, deems impaired respiratory function to be a disability. (Daynard, R.A., "Environmental tobacco smoke and the Americans with Disabilities Act," Nonsmokers' Voice 15(1): 8-9.)

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Alderman find that a significant amount of secondhand smoke exposure occurs in the workplace. Employees who work in smoke-filled businesses suffer a 25-50% higher risk of heart attack and higher rates of death from cardiovascular disease and cancer, as well as increased acute respiratory disease and measurable decrease in lung function. (Pitsavos, C.; Panagiotakos, D.B.; Chrysohoou, C.; Skoumas, J.; Tzioumis, K.; Stefanadis, C.; Toutouras, P., "Association between exposure to environmental tobacco smoke and the development of acute coronary syndromes: the CARDIO2000 case-control study," Tobacco Control 11(3): 220-225, September 2002.)

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Alderman concur with the Society of Actuaries in determining that secondhand smoke costs the U.S. economy roughly \$10 billion a year: \$5 billion in estimated medical costs associated with secondhand smoke exposure and \$4.6 billion in lost productivity, (Behan, D.F.; Eriksen, M.P.; Lin, Y., "Economic Effects of Environmental Tobacco Smoke," Society of Actuaries, March 31, 2005.)

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Alderman note that numerous economic analyses examining restaurant and hotel receipts and controlling for economic variables have shown eithen on difference or a positive economic impact after enactment of laws requiring workplaces to be smoke free. Creation of smoke free workplaces is sound economic policy and provides the maximum level of employee health and safety. (Glantz, S.A. & Smith, L. The effect of ordinances requiring smoke free restaurants on restaurant sales in the United States. American Journal of Public Health, 87:1687-1693, 1997. Colman, R.; Urbonas, C.M., "The economic impact of smoke-free workplaces: an assessment for Nova Scotia, prepared for Tobacco Control Unit, Nova Scotia Department of Health," GPI Atlantic, September 2001.)

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Alderman spinus and declares that the purposes of this ordinance are (1) to protect the public health and welfare by prohibiting smoking in public places and places of employment; and (2) to guarantee the right of nonsmokers to breathe smok free air, and to recognize that the need to breathe smoke free air shall have priority over the des to smoke.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF PETAL, MISSISSIPPI, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Definitions

The following words and phrases, whenever used in this Article, shall be construed as defined in

"Bar" means an establishment that is devoted to the serving of alcoholic beverages for consumption by guests on the premises and in which the serving of food is only incidental to the consumption of those beverages, including but not limited to, taverns, nightclubs, cocktail lounges, and cabarets.

"Business" means a sole proprietorship, partnership, joint venture, corporation, or other business entity, either for-profit or not-for-profit, including retail establishments where goods or services are sold; professional corporations and other entities where legal, medical, dental, engineering, architectural, or other professional services are delivered; and private clubs.

"Employee" means a person who is employed by an employer in consideration for direct or indirect monetary wages or profit, and a person who volunteers his or her services for a non-proficinity.

"Employer" means a person, business, partnership, association, corporation, including a municipal corporation, trust, or non-profit entity that employs the services of one or mo

Employer means a person, business, partnership, association, corporation, including a municipal corporation, rust, or non-profit entity that employs the services of one or more individual persons.

"Enclosed Area" means all space between a floor and ceiling that is enclosed on all sides by solid walls or windows (exclusive of doorways), which extend from the floor to the ceiling.

"Health Care Facility" means an office or institution providing care or treatment of diseases, whether physical, mental, or emotional, or other medical, physiological, or psychological conditions, including but not limited to, hospitals, rehabilitation hospitals or other clinics, including weight control clinics, nursing homes, long-term care facilities, homes for the aging or chronically ill, laboratories, and offices of surgeons, chiropractors, physical therapists, physicians, psychiatrists, dentists, and all specialists within these professions. This definition shall include all waiting rooms, hallways, private rooms, semiprivate rooms, and wards within health care facilities.

- Private clubs when being used for a function to which the general public is invited Public transportation facilities, including buses and taxicabs, under the authority or City of Petal, and ticket, boarding, and waiting areas of public transit depots.

 Rooms, chambers, places of meeting or public assembly, including school buildings, under the control of an agency, board, commission, committee or council of the City of Petal or a political subdivision of the State, to the extent the place is subject to the jurisdiction of the City of Petal.
 Service lines.
 Shopping malls.
 Sports arenas, including enclosed places in outdoor arenas.

- Theaters and other facilities primarily used for exhibiting motion pictures, stage dra lectures, musical recitals, or other similar performances.

Section 4. Prohibition of Smoking in Places of Employment

Smoking shall be prohibited in all enclosed facilities within places of employment without exception. This includes common work areas, auditoriums, classrooms, conference and meeting rooms, private offices, elevators, hallways, medical facilities, cafeterias, employee lounges, stair restrooms, vehicles, and all other euclosed facilities.

This prohibition on smoking shall be communicated to all existing employees by the effective date of this Article and to all prospective employees upon their application for employment.

Section 5. Prohibition of Smoking in Outdoor Areas

Smoking shall be prohibited in the following outdoor places:

- Within a reasonable distance of fifteen (15) feet outside entrances, operable windows, and ventilation systems of enclosed areas where smoking is prohibited, so as to insure that tobacco smoke does not enter those areas.

 In all outdoor arenas, stadiums, and amphitheaters, except in designated smoking areas, which may be established only in perimeter areas at least fifteen (15) feet from any seating areas or concession stands. Smoking shall also be prohibited in, and within fifteen (15) feet of, bleachers and grandstands for use by spectators at sporting and other public events.

 In all public transit stations, platforms, and shelters under the authority of the City of Petal
- On any publicly owned outdoor recreation property

Section 6. Where Smoking Not Regulated

Notwithstanding any other provision of this Article to the contrary, the following areas shall be exempt from the provisions of Sections 3 and 4:

- In outdoor seating or serving areas of restaurants.

 Private residences, except when used as a childcare, adult day care, or health care facility. Not more than twenty percent (20%) of hotel and motel rooms rented to guests and designated as smoking rooms. All smoking rooms on the same floor must be contiguous and smoke from these rooms must not inflittate into rares where smoking is prohibited under the provisions of this Article. The status of rooms as smoking or nonsmoking may not be changed, except to add additional nonsmoking rooms.

 Private clubs that have no employees, except when being used for a function to which the general public is invited; provided that smoke from such clubs does not infiltrate into areas where smoking is prohibited under the provisions of this Article. This exemption shall not apply to any organization that is established for the purpose of avoiding compliance with this Article.

 Outdoor areas of places of employment except those covered by the provisions of Section 5.

Section 7. Declaration of Establish

Notwithstanding any other provision of this Article, an owner, operator, manager, or other person in control of an establishment, facility, or outdoor area may declare that entire establishment,

facility, or outdoor area as a nonsmoking place. Smoking shall be prohibited in any place in which a sign conforming to the requirements of Section 8 is posted.

Section 8. Posting of Signs

"No Smoking" signs of the international "No Smoking" symbol (consisting of a pictorial representation of a burning cigarette enclosed in a red circle with a red bar across (t) shall be clearly and conspicuously posted in every public place and place of employment where smoking is prohibited by this Article, by the owner, operator, manager, or other person in control of that place.

Every public place and place of employment where smoking is prohibited by this Article shall have posted at every entrance a conspicuous sign clearly stating that smoking is prohibited. Every vehicle that constitutes a place of employment under this Article shall have at least one conspicuous sign, visible from the exterior of the vehicle, clearly stating that smoking is prohibited.

All ashtrays shall be removed from any area where smoking is prohibited by this Article by the owner, operator, manager, or other person having control of the area

Section 9. Nonretaliation; Nonwaiver of Rights

No person or employer shall discharge, refuse to hure, or in any manner retainate against an employee, applicant for employment, or customer because that employee, applicant, or customer exercises any rights afforded by this Article or reports or attempts to prosecute a violation of this Naticle Notwithstanding Section 11, violation of this Subsection shall be a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$1000 for each violation.

An employee who works in a setting where an employer allows smoking does not waive or otherwise surrender any legal rights the employee may have against the employer or any other party.

This Article shall be enforced by the City of Petal Code Enforcement Officer or an authorized

designee.
Notice of the provisions of this Article shall be given to all applicants for a business license in the City of Petal.

Any citizen who desires to register a complaint under this Article may initiate enforcement with the Code Enforcement Officer.

The Code Enforcement Department, Building Inspection Department, Fire Department or their designces shall, while an establishment is undergoing otherwise mandated inspections, inspect for compliance with this Article.

An owner, manager, operator, or employee of an establishment regulated by this Article shall inform persons violating this Article of the appropriate provisions thereof. Nowithstanding any other provision of this Article, an employee or private citizen may bring legal action to enforce this Article.

In addition to the remedies provided by the provisions of this Section, the Code Enforcement Officer or any person aggree ed by the failure of the owner, operator, manager, or other person in control of a public place or a place of employment to comply with the provisions of this Article may apply for injunctive relief to enforce those provisions in any court of competent jurisdiction

Section 11. Violations and Penalties

A person who smokes in an area where smoking is prohibited by the provisions of this Article shall be guilty of an infraction, punishable by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars (\$50).

Except as otherwise provided in Section 9, a person who owns, manages, operates, or otherwise controls a public place or place of employment and who fails to comply with the provisions of this Article shall be guilty of an infraction, punishable by

The program may include publication of a brochure for affected businesses and instituduals explaining the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 13. Governmental Agency Cooperation

The City of Petal shall annually request other governmental and educational agencies having facilities within the confines of the city limits of the City of Petal to establish local operating procedures in cooperation and compliance with this Article. This includes urging all Federal, State, Courty, and School District agencies to update their existing smoking control regulations to be consistent with the current health findings regarding secondhand smoke.

Section 14. Other Applicable Laws

This Article shall not be interpreted or construed to permit smoking where it is otherwise restricted by other applicable laws.

Section 15. Liberal Construction

This Article shall be liberally construed so as to further its purp

Section 16. Severability

If any provision, clause, sentence, or paragraph of this Article or the application thereof to any person or circumstances shall be held invalid, that invalidity shall not affect the other provisions of this Article which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this cid the provisions of this Article are declared to be severable.

Section 17. Effective Date

This Article shall be effective thirty (30) days from and after the date of its
